Dean Edson Mann (1927-2014)

Devoted husband, beloved father, grandfather and great-grandfather, Dean Edson Mann passed away in Santa Barbara, California on Monday, April 21, 2014. He was 86.

Dean was born on July 22, 1927 in Ogden, Utah to Leslie John and Veda Nettie Edson Mann. He grew up in Oakland, California and briefly served in the Navy at the end of World War II. He married Helen Joyce Krage (also of Oakland) in Logan, Utah in 1951. This was the beginning of 58 years of marriage that included the raising of 7 children and moves to Arizona, Washington, D.C., Caracas, Venezuela and, then, Santa Barbara, California where they lived for over 35 years. In retirement, Dean and Helen also lived for seven years in Visalia, California before Helen passed away and Dean returned to Santa Barbara.

Dean received his bachelor's degree and doctorate in political science from the University of California at Berkeley and began his early career at the University of Arizona in Tucson. It was there, while finishing his dissertation, teaching and conducting post-doctoral research, that he established himself as an authority on the politics of water in the western United States. In the late 1950s, as a congressional fellow, Dean served on the legislative staff of U.S. Senator Kefauver of Tennessee and, in the early 1960s, as a fellow with the Brookings Institute in Washington D.C. He received a grant from the Ford Foundation in 1962 to work in Caracas, Venezuela for two years and was

accompanied by his family during that wonderful experience.

He began his career in the Department of Political Science at the University of California, Santa Barbara in 1965. As an associate and, then full professor he taught, performed research and published in the areas of American politics, public administration and natural resource policy and twice served as chairman of the department. As a longtime member of the Western Political Science Association, he served as the organization's president and as editor, for over 10 years, of its premier journal, the Western Political Quarterly. With the exception of his service as Chief of the Social and Behavioral Sciences Division at the National Water Commission (1970 to 1971) Dean remained at UCSB until his retirement in 1991.

Dean was an active member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints throughout his life and served faithfully in many capacities. He served as a missionary for the Church between 1947 and 1950 in the New England States mission and also served as the branch president of the Caracas branch while in Venezuela.

A natural athlete, Dean enjoyed watching many sports as well as playing tennis, basketball and swimming throughout his life. He enjoyed the outdoors and he and Helen maintained a lifelong tradition of annual camping with their family at Bass Lake, California – a much-treasured family experience. Dean's favorite hobby was reading and he was a great lover of the fine and performing arts. He and Helen had a love of fine paintings and surrounded themselves with art from all over the world. Dean enjoyed singing in choirs his entire life and sang with the Santa Barbara Choral Society for many years. While in Visalia, Dean was very involved in community affairs including serving on the City of Visalia Environmental and General Plan Update Committees. He also served on the Tulare County Grand Jury and was an active volunteer with the local American Red Cross. He also wrote a book review column entitled "Dean's Reads" for the Visalia Times Delta newspaper. Dean is survived by his seven children, Jeffrey (Marlena) Mann of Puyallup WA, Karen (James) Nelson of Santa Barbara, Lindsay (Lesa) Mann of Visalia,

Preston (Debra) Mann of Santa Barbara, Kimberley (Kurt) Clement of Long Beach, Randall Mann of Palo Alto and Tamara (Vince) Summerhays of Maple Valley, WA. He is also survived by 39 grandchildren and 25 great grandchildren. Dean was beloved by his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren as well as by a large extended family; he will long be remembered for his fine example, good nature, deep compassion, humor and fatherly influence.

Services will be held at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, Santa Barbara Chapel, 2107 Santa Barbara St., Santa Barbara, CA 93105 at 10:00 a.m. on May 1, 2014 with viewing at 9:30 a.m. Interment will immediately follow at the Santa Barbara Cemetery.
