“ Many years ago there was a demand from the ostomy population of central and southern California for better quality of care, proper instruction in post-operative care, and better quality appliances. In 1971 the Santa Barbara Chapter of the United Ostomy Association was formed with unanimous support of Walley Wallenbrock, Hal and Fern Halperin, Joanne Uhl, and Al Geiberger. In 1973 Cottage Hospital and the American Cancer Society funded training and certification of the first Enterostomal Therapist, Janet Layson, who joined the U.O.A. of Santa Barbara in its dedication to support ostomates.
